	 Definition of a positive statement (assertion of a fact / it can be tested as true or false / a scientific approach to economics / objective). (1 mark) 	
	 Definition of a normative statement (one that is based on a value judgement / it cannot be tested as true or false / a non-scientific approach to economics / subjective). (1 mark) 	
	 Application: Statement 1 is positive as it can be tested by reference to government Budget report over the tax increase on tobacco. (1 mark) 	
	 Application: Statement 2 is normative as it includes the word `unjustified`. (1 mark) 	(4)

4	 Answer C (1 mark) Definition of a positive statement: (one that is based on fact / it can be tested as true or false / a scientific approach to economics / objective approach). (1 mark) Definition of a normative statement: (one that is based on value judgement / it cannot be tested as true or false / a non-scientific approach to economics / subjective approach). (1 mark) NB: Do not award for defining a normative statement as an opinion. Application to statement 1: (it is positive since it can be tested or checked with her Majesty's Revenue and Customs to see if income earners above £150,000 pay a tax rate of 50 per cent.). (1 mark) Application to statement 2: (it is normative since people may disagree with the 50 per cent tax rate being unfair / use of the word 'unfair' means it is a value judgement.). (1 mark) 	(4)

5	 Answer C Definition of a positive statement is required (one that is based on fact / it can be tested as true or false / a scientific approach to economics / objective statement) (1 mark). Definition of a normative statement (one that is based on value judgement / it cannot be tested as true or false / a non-scientific approach to economics / subjective statement) (1 mark). NB Do not accept 'opinion' as an explanation of a normative statement 	
	 Application: statement 1 is positive since it can be tested to see whether financial sector workers did receive more than £13 billion in bonuses. (1 mark). Application: statement 2 is normative since it contains the word 'fair' (1 mark). 	(4)

	 Statement 2 is normative as it contains the value judgement of 'unfair' (1 mark). 	(3)

(1 mark) NB do not accept use of term 'opinion'. Data reference to title of Extract 2: a normative statement since it refers to the term 'unfair'. (1 mark).

	 Explanation of positive statement (1 mark): Factual statement / can be tested as true or false / based on scientific or objective approach to the subject. 	
	• Application: title of extract 1 is positive since possible to test whether the tuition fees will increase / up to £9000 (1 mark).	
	 Explanation of normative statement (1 mark): Value judgement / cannot be tested as true or false / based on a non-scientific or subjective approach to the subject. 	
	NB do not accept use of term 'opinion'.	
	 Application: title of extract 2 is normative since the term 'unfair' is a value judgement (1 mark). 	(4)
