Answers without working may gain no credit. 1. (a) Express  $\frac{6x+10}{x+3}$  in the form  $p + \frac{q}{x+3}$ , where p and q are integers to be found.

- **2.** (a) (i) Explain why, for any two vectors **a** and **b**,  $\mathbf{a}.\mathbf{b} \times \mathbf{a} = 0$ .
  - (ii) Given vectors **a**, **b** and **c** such that  $\mathbf{a} \times \mathbf{b} = \mathbf{a} \times \mathbf{c}$ , where  $\mathbf{a} \neq \mathbf{0}$  and  $\mathbf{b} \neq \mathbf{c}$ , show that

$$\mathbf{b} - \mathbf{c} = \lambda \mathbf{a}$$
, where  $\lambda$  is a scalar.

- (b) **A**, **B** and **C** are  $2 \times 2$  matrices.
  - (i) Given that AB = AC, and that A is not singular, prove that B = C.

(ii) Given that AB = AC, where  $A = \begin{pmatrix} 3 & 6 \\ 1 & 2 \end{pmatrix}$  and  $B = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 5 \\ 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix}$ , find a matrix C whose elements are all non-zero. (3)

## **3.** The line $l_1$ has equation

$$\mathbf{r} = \mathbf{i} + 6\mathbf{j} - \mathbf{k} + \lambda(2\mathbf{i} + 3\mathbf{k})$$

and the line  $l_2$  has equation

 $\mathbf{r} = 3\mathbf{i} + p\mathbf{j} + \mu(\mathbf{i} - 2\mathbf{j} + \mathbf{k})$ , where *p* is a constant.

The plane  $\Pi_1$  contains  $l_1$  and  $l_2$ .

- (a) Find a vector which is normal to  $\Pi_1$ .
- (*b*) Show that an equation for  $\Pi_1$  is 6x + y 4z = 16.
- (c) Find the value of p.

The plane  $\Pi_2$  has equation  $\mathbf{r} \cdot (\mathbf{i} + 2\mathbf{j} + \mathbf{k}) = 2$ .

(d) Find an equation for the line of intersection of  $\Pi_1$  and  $\Pi_2$ , giving your answer in the form

$$(\mathbf{r} - \mathbf{a}) \times \mathbf{b} = \mathbf{0}. \tag{5}$$

4. A complex number z is represented by the point P in the Argand diagram. Given that

$$|z-3i| = 3,$$

- (*a*) sketch the locus of *P*.
- (b) Find the complex number z which satisfies both |z 3i| = 3 and  $\arg(z 3i) = \frac{3}{4}\pi$ .

The transformation T from the z-plane to the w-plane is given by

$$w = \frac{2i}{w}$$

(c) Show that T maps |z - 3i| = 3 to a line in the *w*-plane, and give the cartesian equation of this line.

$$z^n - \frac{1}{z^n} = 2\mathbf{i}\,\sin n\theta\,,$$

where n is a positive integer.

(*b*) Show that

$$\sin^5 \theta = \frac{1}{16} (\sin 5\theta - 5\sin 3\theta + 10\sin \theta).$$

(c) Hence solve, in the interval  $0 \le \theta < 2\pi$ ,

$$\sin 5\theta - 5\sin 3\theta + 6\sin \theta = 0.$$

6. The variable *y* satisfies the differential equation

$$4(1+x^2)\frac{\mathrm{d}^2 y}{\mathrm{d}x^2} + 4x\frac{\mathrm{d}y}{\mathrm{d}x} = y.$$

At 
$$x = 0$$
,  $y = 1$  and  $\frac{dy}{dx} = \frac{1}{2}$ .  
(a) Find the value of  $\frac{d^2 y}{dx^2}$  at  $x = 0$ .

(b) Use the approximations

$$\left(\frac{\mathrm{d}^2 y}{\mathrm{d}x^2}\right)_0 \approx \frac{(y_1 - 2y_0 + y_{-1})}{h^2} \text{ and } \left(\frac{\mathrm{d}y}{\mathrm{d}x}\right)_0 \approx \frac{y_1 - y_{-1}}{2h}, \text{ with } h = 0.1,$$

to find an estimate of y, at x = 0.1, to 5 decimal places.

(c) Find the value of  $\frac{d^3 y}{dx^3}$  at x = 0.
