Section AAnswer Question 01.

Source A

From a letter written by Thomas Müntzer to the people of Allstedt, April 1525, encouraging them to join a peasants' uprising.

How long are you going to sleep, how long are you going to resist God's will just because you think that God has given up on you?

Even if there are only three of you whose trust in God is unshakeable and who seek His Name, you need have no fear of a hundred thousand people. So go to it, go to it, go to it! Show no pity. Pay no attention to the cries of the godless. They will plead with you ever so warmly; they will whimper like children. Show no pity. Alert the villages and towns and other good fellows who will be of use. 5

We cannot sleep any longer.

Source B

From Luther's pamphlet 'Against the Robbing and Murdering Hordes of Peasants' (April to May 1525).

The peasants have violently taken matters into their own hands and are robbing and raging like mad dogs to their own ends. It is clear that they were trying to deceive us and that their promises made in their Twelve Articles were nothing but lies presented under the name of the Gospel. They are doing the devil's work. This is the work of that arch-devil, Müntzer. They have committed terrible sins against God and man and have deserved death in both body and soul. They hide their terrible and horrible sin with the Gospel, call themselves 'Christian Brethren', and force people to go along with them in these abominations. Thus they become the worse blasphemers of God and slanderers of His Holy Name. 5
